



The Navigator NMCA VP, Wallace Bow



Now, that's my kind of racing! No confusing track layout, no cones to drive around (or over). It's simple: just one-quarter mile of straight asphalt for me and the same for the other guy. Light turns green; Go faster than the other guy.

Well, that's probably oversimplifying it, but I would like to refer you, gentle reader, to my drag-racingrelated predictions from last month's article in this newsletter where I said:

- My new aluminum rocker arms would make me go a little faster.
- I would be five full seconds off of the fastest time of the day.

Both predictions turned out to be prophetic: I picked up two tenths compared to my last trip out to the drag strip and the weather was roughly the same so those valves did open a little bit farther just like they were supposed to. My time improved to a 13.82 @ 99 mph. Not in Z06 territory, but respectable.

My dad towed his NHRA Super Comp 'Vette down from Kansas (not Oklahoma, as mentioned on the PA system) and those in attendance were treated to a series of 8-second passes, culminating in an 8.88 second run at 162.5 miles per hour! The time slip on the 8.88 run also shows a reaction time of .025, proving that the old man can still get his finger off of the trans brake button in a hurry when he needs to. (Don't tell him that I called him an old man, though.)

Having driven the car a few times myself, I've considered leasing it from him for a year or two after he decides that he doesn't want to drive it any more. It's really a kick to drive and I know I'd have plenty of people willing to crew for me on weekends. Ah, but I don't have much of a garage here in the city and the thing does require a lot of maintenance. You've gotta change valve springs a couple of times per year and you can only make 200 runs on the connecting rods (aluminum) before they have to be removed and checked for stretch. Plus, I'd need a tow vehicle to get it around, the CTS doesn't have the guts to pull that big ol' trailer. And, you never know when the engine will decide that it's had one too many trips to 9000 RPM and disassemble itself automatically for you on the racetrack.

It's not all fun and games either when you have that much equipment around and there's a lot to keep track of. Spectators to his first pass of the day saw the car get all over the track and finally be shut down before half track to coast to an 11.00 at just over 100 miles per hour. The culprit: He normally tows the car with 10 psi of air in the tires so that it doesn't bounce as much when it's in the trailer. He just forgot to lower the tire pressure before running it, causing the tires to spin. I think the last run of the day was with 41/2 psi, which is a little on the low side for that car, but it was necessary to try to eliminate the half-track wheelspin.

Also, the car doesn't run an alternator, so that means that the batteries (yes, two full sized car batteries are required to start a 14.5:1 compression big block when it's hot) need to be charged every three runs or so. The portable generator didn't start, so he had to hunt down a nearby outlet and string a long extension cord in order to keep the batteries up.

It's a lot of work. But, like I said, it's really fun to drive. Maybe I could lease it from him for a year...

After our May 1st caravan I have come to the conclusion that perhaps not everyone, including myself, is aware of what is expected of him or her and others in a caravan.

When driving from one town to another, these few simple rules should be followed.

- 1. A lead car should be designated.
- 2. Drive with headlights on.
- 3. Keep in sight of the car behind you. If you need to stop or slow down flash headlights or if radios are being used advise your intentions/needs. The car ahead relays to the next car. Continue relaying forward until the lead is aware of what is happening.
- 4. Re-group at the city limits where open highway speed signs are posted.
- 5. No passing of other members of caravan unless the member waves you around.
- 6. Allow car-passing space between cars.
- 7. Use hand signals for slowing down, stopping or turning.
- 8. Obey all speed signs and other traffic signs.





General Meeting Minutes May 21, 2004

- Meeting was called to order at 7:05 p.m. by Phil Ellison.
- Janet introduced the guests plus new member John Hayden.
- Members decided to meet at Sonic Burger @ San Mateo & Montgomery after the meeting.
- Lori had nothing new to report regarding the club finances; all bills are paid and current.
- David asked members to check the current membership list for any address, phone or web changes; please let him know.
- Ron mentioned that those who were attending the Corvette Convention in Las Vegas 6/5-11, would be leaving Saturday 6/5. Contact Ron re: time/place of departure.
- Ron also talked about the Durango trip 7/3-5; he was able to negotiate reduced room rates for the Cascade Village (see website). A group will leave on Saturday, 7/3, from Lowe's @ Paseo del Norte and I-25 @ 8:30 a.m.; we plan to stop on the way for lunch. The Silverton Parade is on Sunday, 7/4 @ 10 a.m. Theme: "Summer of Love"; fireworks will be Sunday evening; leave for home Monday after breakfast @ Christy May's in Durango.
- Dan Bond mentioned that he read in the Corvette Quarterly that C-5's with interlock problems will be fixed at no charge to car owners.
- Phil talked about the drag races scheduled for Saturday, May 22. Gates open at 2:30, start @ 3 p.m (no cost to club members). HELMETS REQUIRED!
- Dick talked about the caravan on Sunday, May 23, to Embudo Station. Those participating will meet @ Lowe's @ Paseo del Norte & I-25 11:45; leave at noon. We will have lunch @ Embudo Station (those interested can take in the gas station up the road, where antiques were available for viewing & purchase).
- Wallace passed around a sample of the hat/lapel pins for members to look at. He also mentioned that the 1000 hp Corvette owned by Wallace Bow Sr. would be at the drag strip on Saturday for viewing. In addition he told members that the cones the club ordered had been received.
- Under new business: Wallace Bow read a portion of the New Mexico Corvette Association By-Laws. This was a prelude to presenting information to attending club members regarding the incident which occurred on May 1, 2004, during the club caravan to Truth or Consequences, New Mexico, for the annual TorC parade. Vice President Wallace Bow told the members present that he had conducted an investigation into charges/allegations against Rich Mlcezko for conduct unbecoming a club member. He presented his findings and opened it up for discussion among the membership. At the conclusion of the discussion, the Council members adjourned to vote on whether to censure or dismiss Rich Mlcezko. The vote was 5 to 2 in favor of dismissal. Phil and Janet Ellison absented themselves from voting as they were both directly involved in the incident.
- Next Council meeting will be June 1st at American Property, 3825 Hawkins at 7 pm. All members welcome to attend.
- The meeting was adjourned by Wallace Bow @ 8:15 p.m.

Council Meeting Minutes June 1, 2004

- Meeting was called to order by Vice President Wallace Bow at 7:05 pm. Officers in attendance were Phil, Wallace, David, Ron, Suzanne, Dick, Bill, Janet and Lori. NMCA club members Honey, Ted, Chuck were in attendance plus Mary and Rich Mleczko and their daughter Sarah.
- Vice President Wallace Bow gave the Executive Council and member visitors instructions regarding the evenings proceedings. He quoted from the New Mexico Corvette Association By-Laws Article 7, Section D. subsection 3. with reference to the 5/1/04 caravan incident involving Rich Mleczko. He stated where the Council was with reference to that incident and that at tonight's meeting, the accused would be allowed to present his case for defense. Wallace stated per Robert's Rules of Order, that while the accused had the floor there would be no discussion or comments allowed. Wallace also stated that a 2/3 vote (5 of 7 votes) was needed to carry any motion voted upon regarding the incident.
- Vice President Bow asked the accused, Rich Mleczko to present his case. Rich Mleczko then stood and briefly stated that he didn't feel there was any need to rehash the incident. Rich also made a verbal apology to NMCA President, Phil Ellison. Rich then made a motion for the Club Council members to vote on suspension for himself and his wife, Mary Mleczko, through the end of the fiscal year, 11-1-04. The motion was seconded by Bill Jackson and approved by Vice President Bow. Wallace called for discussion; there was none. At that point Janet and Phil Ellison and Rich Mleczko were excused from the meeting and left the room.
- It was decided by the Executive Council members to vote by secret ballot. The Council then voted whether they would approve the motion for suspension presented by Rich Mleczko. The vote did not carry; 4-3. Wallace informed the excused members of the fact that the vote did not carry.
- Wallace Bow opened up the floor for further discussion, at which point Honey Sailley asked for clarification as to what occurred on 5/1/04. Governor Ron Scott gave a brief outline of the events leading to the motion for suspension/dismissal of Rich Mleczko. Wallace then asked if anyone else who actually witnessed the Incident wished to add anything further. No additional information was forthcoming. Bill Jackson made a motion that the Executive Council vote to dismiss Rich Mleczko. The motion was seconded by Ron Scott.
- The Council then cast a second secret ballot to dismiss; the vote did not carry, 4-3. Wallace informed the excused members of the outcome of the second vote.
- The Council discussed alternatives to the original suspension motion and the motion to dismiss. Lori Jordan made a motion that Rich Mleczko should apologize in writing to all Club members who were in attendance at the 5/1 Caravan. In addition, that Rich and Mary Mleczko be suspended from active membership through 12/31/04. There was some additional discussion, after which Lori's motion was seconded by Suzanne and a third vote took place. The third vote carried (6 yea and 1 nay) at 7:47 p.m. Wallace Bow then notified all the members excused from the meeting of the outcome of the vote; they returned at that time. Vice President Wallace Bow then made a formal announcement to Rich and Mary Mleczko of the decision of the Executive Council to suspend their membership in NMCA through 12/31/04 and that Rich would remit a written apology to all NMCA members who were in attendance at the 5/1/04 caravan incident.
- Then Wallace proposed that the Council set up a procedure, denoting a chain of command that
 members could utilize when an incident of any nature occurs. He stated that he would write up a draft
 for possible addition to either the By-Laws or Standing Rules and would bring said draft to the next
 Council meeting in July, 2004, for review and discussion. He also stated that he hoped that there would
 be no further incidents involving Club members and that any rift within NMCA could be healed.
- Janet Ellison suggested that perhaps a 'code of conduct' might be in order for NMCA members also to be added to the By-Laws or Standing Rules.
- Vice president Wallace Bow adjourned the meeting at 8:00 p.m.

We are 9 months into a new and improved web site, yet we still have members having difficulties. So, one more time . . . let's review some basics. Logging in should be and can be very easy. You were given a log-in name when your account was created. This log-in name is your first and last name, with a space between the two names. This name is not something that can be changed. We elected to use real names, and not allow nicknames or handles. This first or top window is where your name goes, and it is not case sensitive. The next widow is for your password. When your account was created, an INITIAL password was assigned. Every member received instructions that they should immediately change their password. After logging in, the very first screen that comes up is a welcome screen, and by clicking "Your Info" you will arrive at a page where your password can be changed. Passwords need to be a minimum of 8 characters. Finally, the third window is a security code window. The computer generates a new unique code each time you log in. Just insert this same 6 digit number, and you're set to go. If you forget your password, just try logging on. You'll get a message saying your log-in was not valid. Below this will be a link that says "forgot password". If that's the case, click this link and allow the system to generate a new password for you. The new password will be sent to the e-mail address you have listed in "Your Info". If you change Internet service and/or your e-mail address, be sure to update this account, otherwise the system won't know how to reach you. If you are still encountering difficulties, send a message to info@nmcorvette.org. Don't miss out on the newsletter, expanded photos, forums and other member only access areas. The goal is for all members to enjoy the web site, not to fight it.

Question: I know my new computer has one hard drive, the C drive, but when I click My Computer or use Windows Explorer, I see three drives, a C, D, and E, in addition to my A drive and my CD drive, which is F. What are those other drives?

Answer: It sounds like your hard drive is divided into several sections -- think of them as several smaller drives called "partitions." Some PC manufacturers and users partition the large C drive to permit the segregation of data from programs or, for example, business from personal files. Partitions are also a popular way to run multiple operating systems on one computer. For example, digital masochists might run Windows 98 and Windows 2000 or Windows XP on the same computer, but on different drives to keep them separate. Q. I'm confused about the relationship between Outlook Express and Internet Explorer. Can you explain the difference between the two or why I need both? Is Windows Explorer the same as Internet Explorer? A. Here's the skinny on IE and OE: Internet Explorer is your Web browser, primarily used to view Web pages; Outlook Express is your email program, used to send and receive email. The only relationship between the two programs is that Outlook Express is usually configured to be Internet Explorer's default email program. What that means is this: Let's say you're viewing a Web page (using Internet Explorer) and you click an email link (called a "mailto" link) in order to send a message to a person referenced on that Web page. If Outlook Express is your default email program, when you click the email link, OE will open and the address will appear in the To: field, saving you the trouble of typing it in manually. If you decide at some point to use an email program other than OE, you'll be able to set that up as your default instead of Outlook Express. Internet Explorer is happy to defer to whatever applications you would like to use. Simply click Tools > Internet Options > Programs, and make your selection. Windows Explorer (Start > Programs > Windows Explorer or Start > Programs > Accessories > Windows Explorer) is unrelated to Internet Explorer other than sharing the same surname. Windows Explorer is used to explore and manage (view, copy, move, delete) files and folders on your computer's various drives.



Question: If I don't shut down Windows 98 correctly, Scan Disk automatically runs the next time I turn the computer on. Is there any way to disable Scan Disk so it won't run?

Answer: Scan Disk automatically checks your hard drive after an "illegal" shut down to make sure no damage has occurred. While that's a good thing and well advised. if you manually run Scan Disk on a regular basis, you can speed up restarts by disabling this automated function.

To prevent Scan Disk from running if Windows is not shut down properly, click Start > Programs > Accessories > System Tools > System Information. In the window that appears, click the Tools menu and select System Configuration Utility > General tab > Advanced button, and place a check mark beside Disable Scan Disk after bad shutdown. Click OK > OK to exit.




Another Banner Day
