HOW TO SAVE AT THE GAS PUMP (Information from the Department of Energy)

Tips on Pumping Gas:

I don't know what you folks are paying at the gas station, but it's close to \$3.50 for premium. So here are some tricks to get more of your moneys worth @ the pump. At the Kinder Morgan Pipeline in San Jose, CA, they deliver 4 million gallons in a 24-hr period. One day is diesel, the next jet fuel & gas (regular & premium). They have 34 storage tanks with a total capacity of 16,800.000 gallons. In the petroleum business the specific gravity & temperature of the gas is very important. Unlike service stations, the temperature is controlled so that each tanker filled is temperature compensated so every gallon is actually the exact amount. Gas stations don't have the capacity to control the temperature & even +1 degree can make a big difference.

1) Only buy or fill up on gas early in the morning

Gas station storage tanks are buried underground; the colder the ground the more dense the gas. In the afternoon/evening it's warmer & the gas expands, so your gallon is really a gallon. Gas stations can't control the temperature compensation @ the pumps.

2) **DO NOT SQUEEZE**

When you're filling up <u>do not</u> squeeze the trigger of the nozzle to a fast mode. If you look you will see that the trigger has three (3)stages: low, middle, and high. In slow mode <u>you should be pumping on low speed</u>, thereby minimizing the vapors that are created while you are pumping. All hoses at the pump have a vapor return. If you are pumping on the fast rate, some of the liquid that goes to your tank becomes vapor. Those vapors are being sucked up and back into the underground storage tank so you're getting less worth for your money.

3) Fill When ½ Empty or 1/2 Full

One of the most important tips is to *fill up when your gas tank is HALF FULL or HALF EMPTY.* The reason for this is, the more gas you have in your tank the less air occupying its empty space. Gasoline evaporates faster than you can imagine. Gasoline storage tanks have an internal floating roof. This roof serves as zero clearance between the gas and the atmosphere, so it minimizes the evaporation. Unlike service stations, here where I work, every truck that we load is temperature compensated so that every gallon is actually the exact amount.

4) DO NOT FILL UP WHEN TANKERS ARE UNLOADING GAS

Another reminder, if there is a gasoline truck pumping into the storage tanks when you stop to buy gas, **DO NOT fill up** --most likely the gasoline is being stirred up as the gas is being delivered, and you might pick up some of the dirt that normally settles on the bottom. Hope this will help you get the most value for your money.
